4. PURPOSE AND DEFINITION OF THE EDUCATIONAL PROJECT

Definition of an Educational Project

The educational project is a strategic tool through which an educational institution can define its policy orientations, priority actions, and expected results and inform its community in this regard, with a view to ensuring educational success for all students regardless of age. The educational project reflects the characteristics and needs of the students who attend the educational institution, as well as the community's expectations regarding education. The result of a consensus, this project is prepared and implemented through the collaborative efforts of the various school stakeholders: students, parents, teachers, and other school staff members as well as community and school service center representatives.

The educational project therefore forms part of a process designed to promote coordinated action and synergy among the various levels of the education system (MEQ, school service centers, and educational institutions), with due regard for their specific areas of autonomy and characteristics.

5. CONTENT OF AN EDUCATIONAL PROJECT (Education Act, sections 37 and 97.1)

According to the EA, an educational institution's educational project must meet the following requirements:

- cover a period that is harmonized with the period covered by the school service center's commitment-to-success plan and the period covered by the MEQ strategic plan (EA, sections 37.1, 97.2 and 209.1)
- where applicable, comply with the terms established by the Minister to coordinate the entire strategic planning process between the educational institutions, the school service center and the MEQ (EA, section 459.3)
- be consistent with the school service center's commitment-to-success plan (EA, sections 37 and 97.1)
- when analyzing its situation, including its results with respect to the strategic orientations and objectives set out in the commitment-to-success plan, the educational institution must consider the relevance of including the orientations and objectives of the commitment-to-success plan in the educational project. In this case, it is up to the educational institution to decide on its own target, which may be different from the target set by the school service center. If, in addition, an educational institution deems it appropriate given its situation and priorities, nothing prevents it from supplementing its educational project with other orientations or objectives different from those specified in the school service center's commitment-to-success plan.

8. SCHOOL CONTEXT - INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL ENVIRONMENTS (Education Act, section 97.1)

Knowledge of the context is the cornerstone of the process involved in preparing an educational project. The educational project must set out an analysis of the external and internal environment in which the educational institution acts.

School and its Community

Location

South Hull Elementary School is in the city of Gatineau (Aylmer sector) in the district of Deschenes on the corner of Vanier Road and Promenade Crescent. We have two parks in our neighborhood: Robert Stewart Park and Lakeview Park.

Kindergarten to Cycle 3

At our school, we offer Kindergarten to Grade 6. Specifically, we have three Kindergarten classes, two Grade 1 classes, one Grade 1/2 split class, two Grade 2 classes, two Grade 3 classes, two Grade 4 classes, one Grade 3/4 split class, two Grade 5 classes, two Grade 6 classes, and two Grade 5/6 split 5/6 classes. We also have one Special Education Center which includes 7 students with high needs.

Regular and French Immersion Program

On September 30, 2023, we had a population of 375 students and still growing at South Hull Elementary School. Our school is a dual-track school where we offer two programs: Regular and French immersion. Approximately 47% of our students are registered in the Regular program and 53% of our students are registered in the French Immersion program. The language of instruction is broken down in the Regular and French Immersion programs as follows:


School Transportation

Since most students live somewhat close to the school, only 63% of our students take transportation before and after school. We have approximately 40 students (11%) that walk to school.

Daycare and Enrolment

At the South Hull Daycare Centre, children have access to a variety of educational and cultural activities, ranging from science to literature and the arts. In addition, these services support special needs students and promote inclusiveness. Daycare hours of operation are 7:00AM - 8:00AM before school, lunch time from 11:40AM to 12:30PM and after school from 2:30PM to 6:00PM (5:00PM on PD Days). As of September 30, 2023, Daycare enrolment is 129 students, about 34 % of our total school population.

Construction of South Hull: A building with History



South Hull was originally built in 1950, with several additions through the years. In 1950, the main office and kindergarten hallway along with the large gym were built. In 1953, the small gym was built and was fully renovated 2 years ago. In 1959, the junior hallway was built, and in 1975, the east wing where our library is located was built. Lastly, our senior hallway opened in 1982.

Socio-Economic Factors

On a rating from 1 to 10, with 1 being the highest socio-economic status, South Hull School is rated 2, suggesting that most students should have the necessary financial and educational support available in their home environment to promote learning.

Community Police Officer

Every school in the Gatineau area can count on the assistance of a designated police officer.

This officer works primarily to prevent crime by taking preventive action. Among other things, he or she takes part in various activities aimed at optimizing the quality of life within the

schools, and visits students at different levels to talk to them about various issues. Topics covered include violence and bullying, through our VIP or Parapluie programs, and internet safety. Police officers may also be called upon to conduct operations targeting road safety issues around schools.

Working in partnership with school principals and other community stakeholders, the police educator can intervene with students in a variety of situations. He or she can take complaints about criminal offences and take the necessary measures to resolve the problem, all in compliance with the Youth Criminal Justice Act, which, while respecting victims, aims to rehabilitate and reintegrate young people into society to ensure they develop to their full potential.

Home and School Association

South Hull Elementary School has a very active Home and School Association where they organize fundraisers and finance projects, activities, and others pedagogical supplies to promote student learning. The association comprises 7 executive members (13 total members) and two staff members: Chris Beauchamp (Teacher) and Erick Tremblay (Principal). Additionally, the association has at least 30 volunteers that help with special events. The association meets once a month during the school year for approximately 60-75 minutes.

Governing Board

The Governing Board comprises 18 members, one of the largest in the WQSB. The committee meets every month during the school year for approximately 60-75 minutes. The Governing Board is responsible for approving and overseeing various issues, including educational projects, school budget implementation, and regulation and student supervision policies.

Symmes Junior High and D'Arcy McGee High School

South Hull Elementary School is a feeder school to Symmes Junior High School (Grade 7-8) and D'Arcy McGee High School (Grades 9-11). The school is in Gatineau (Aylmer sector) in the Plateau neighborhood less than 3 km from our school.

Staff Breakdown

The staff at South Hull is comprised of 1 principal, 19 homeroom teachers, 6 specialist teachers (including two physical education teachers, two French teachers, including one part-time French teacher, one ELA teacher, and one full-time remedial teacher), 14 attendants, 1 special needs technician, 2 office assistants, 2 caretakers, 1 daycare technician, and 10 daycare educators. Teachers range in teaching experience from 1 to 28 years. The principal of South Hull has 5 years of experience as an administrator in elementary and secondary schools.

What the School has to Offer

The school does not have a cafeteria, but we offer a lunch program through Mazzola where parents can purchase lunches every day of the week. Parents also have the option to order meals and treats for Subway Day, Pizza Day, and Popcorn Day from Our Home and School Association on specific days of the month (Approx. 1/week). As a school, a portion of our Nutrition Grant goes towards buying additional food for students in need. There are a variety of sports activities offered to Cycle 3 students, including: soccer, football, basketball, volleyball, softball and track and field. Extra-curricular activities offered at South Hull vary from year to year depending on staff participation. Students are encouraged to participate in these extra curriculars, including Bus and Lunch Monitors, Nouvelles de South Hull News, Coding Club, and Holiday Concert. To inform the staff, students and parents at South Hull, Nouvelles de South Hull News shares monthly news about classroom and extra-curricular activities in video format. We also hired a certified yoga instructor that offers yoga classes to teach students mindfulness and self-regulation techniques.

South Hull School is committed to promoting a safe and inclusive environment for all students and staff. The Not in My School and Playground Activity Leaders in Schools (PALS) initiatives have promoted a safe and non-violent school environment, empowering students to be leaders in their school.

To promote student achievement and well-being, the school has received a variety of ministry grants including grants for: supporting special needs or at-risk students, nutrition grant, tutoring, cultural outing events, reading awareness, health, wellness and physical activity, library, professional development, Anti-Violence Anti-Bullying (AVAB) and an inspirational budget to stimulate student talents and aptitudes.

Each year, South Hull participates in the annual Terry Fox Run. During the 2023-24 school year, students and staff raised a remarkable amount: over than \$30 000. The South Hull community is very dedicated and generous. They have raised over \$300 000 since we started the Terry Fox Run. The school also participates annually in Scholastic Book Fairs to promote literacy, raising roughly \$2 000 per year to support the purchase of books.

9. CONSISTENCY WITH THE COMMITMENT-TO-SUCCESS PLAN

South Hull ensures consistency with the school board's commitment-to-success plan.

Depending on the analysis of its context and priorities, the educational institution may also include specific orientations, objectives and/or targets, as long as it is justified by the analysis of the context (EA, sections 37 et 97.1).

10. CHALLENGES, ORIENTATIONS, OBJECTIVES, INDICATORS, AND TARGETS SPECIFIC TO THE INSTITUTION

The staff has been trained through various professional development workshops and conferences. The school is not obtaining the results expected in FSL, but we have observed improvement in end of year results from Cycle 2 to Cycle 3, when comparing the same group of students.

French Second Language (FSL), which is taught in the Regular stream, continues to be an area of concern. It was felt that the increase of FSL from 200 minutes (4 periods a week) to 250 minutes (5 periods) would expose students more to the French language daily, which according to research is what is needed to learn a second language. During the school year, new students at our school arriving from out-of-province, get extra support which is paid out of a grant we receive from the Ministry called Service D'accueil. Also, we have hired a retired teacher support students in French, both in the French Immersion and Regular Program (Français de Base) Despite the increase in FSL minutes in the schedule and the extra support in French, many students in the Regular Program are still performing well below grade level in FSL. This is especially true for students for whom French is a third language.

When comparing student results within the two programs (Regular and French Immersion) there is a notable achievement gap in all core subjects. The staff at South Hull continue to strive to find strategies to improve learning and results for this group of students.

The WQSB Mathematics and ELA consultants offer workshops for teachers to use the latest strategies and techniques to support teaching and learning. For ELA teachers, our consultant has offered PD on constellations lessons. Constellations provides a bank of text suggestions that each come with a focused ready to use- mini lesson. It's often a great first step when considering what titles teachers want to add to their classroom library, with the goal of adding new authentic texts to their classroom. Additionally, workshops were offered for anchoring student writing and using the writers' checklists, a close look at the oracy toolkit (talk competency) or using select writing strategies from *The Writing Strategies Book*. South Hull Elementary will also celebrate Love of Reading Month in February to make reading fun for students.

As for mathematics, there is an emphasis on situational problems, Mastery of Mathematical Concepts and Processes (MMCPs) and problems that engage students with cognitive

dissonance. Workshops were given and will continue to be offered to guide teachers in the use of manipulatives to increase understanding of math concepts for all learners. Students will use the IXL Learning website for practice in class and at home.

The WQSB French consultants will continue to support our teaching staff to develop strategies and best practices to improve literacy outcomes in both languages (SoundPrints and l'Approche Signature).
